Long Beach Transit Board of Directors Opposes Proposition 6
*The November ballot measure will take nearly \$10 million away
from local transit services*

LONG BEACH, CALIF. (September 24, 2018) – Today the Long Beach Transit Board of Directors stood with business, environmental, labor, public interest and other transportation agencies around California by opposing Proposition 6, a ballot measure that repeals Senate Bill 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

“LBT stands to lose nearly \$10 million dollars that we would invest in important transit services if the voters approve Proposition 6,” said President and CEO Kenneth A. McDonald. “That means fewer clean, battery electric buses for our customers, the inability of LBT to expand bus service and countless negative impacts statewide.”

When Governor Brown signed Senate Bill 1 (SB1), the State committed \$54 billion over ten years to local agencies to fix roads and bridges, improve public transit and clean the air. This funding is a critical part of Long Beach Transit’s plans to have an entire fleet of alternatively fueled buses by 2020 with the long-term goal of going all-electric. These funds are also used to keep well maintained buses on the streets to take customers to schools, their job and everywhere they need to go every day.

“LBT is committed to environmental sustainability and reducing our carbon footprint,” said McDonald. “We cannot achieve this goal and meet State mandates without the commitments in SB1 to purchase clean buses, enhance LBT services and implement the Systemwide Transit Analysis and Reassessment (STAR) recommendations. I thank our Board of Directors for opposing Proposition 6.”
